

The Chicken Strikes Again

Mounties Outgun Troopers At The Shoot To Keep Trophy On Canadian Soil

The same target that fouled up the tactical run for both Alaska State Troopers top shooters Sgt. Tim Schoenberg and Sgt. Odean Hall when they ran through the course in Whitehorse, Yukon two years ago got the best of Royal Canadian Mounted Police's ace Constable Ryan Hack at this year's shooting competition between the two northern law enforcement agencies Aug. 13-16.

Hack was the top shooter for the target shooting portion of the 50th RCMP-AST International Shooting Competition, otherwise known as The Shoot. However, on Sunday, Aug. 16 in Whitehorse, the chicken got the

best of him, possibly robbing him of victory for the tactical portion of the anniversary shoot. Instead, Hall, who fell victim to one of the 10 chicken-shaped metal targets two years prior, took home the prize by edging RCMP's Ian Fraser

Like two years ago, one of the targets spun sideways instead of falling over when a round struck the metal – giving shooters only the thin edge of the flat target to shoot. This time and because of what the target did two years ago, Hack was allowed to reposition from a different angle after he had knocked the rest of the chickens over. Unfortunately for him, his rhythm was already thrown off. Luckily for him, the tactical contest

year in a row by besting RCMP Chief Superintendent Peter Clark. Clark also celebrated his 50th birthday that weekend – his age matching the event he competed in.

While the event is built up around a shooting contest, it's more about camaraderie between the Troopers and Mounties. Shortly after Alaska became a state in 1959, Inspector Joe Vachon, commanding officer of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, wanted to find a way for the Mounties and Troopers to get

is separate from the main part of the competition – the target shooting. Hack's rhythm was not off for this part as he came out on top of all the shooters and led his team to victory over the Troopers. After spending two years on American soil, the RCMPs will get to keep the team trophy in Canada, winning the team portion on Saturday, Aug. 14. The RCMP's significant others also bested the American ladies. Sgt. Tim Schoenberg, of Fairbanks Judicial Services, was the top shooter for AST during the target portion on Saturday, coming in second to Hack. Schoenberg has been competing in The Shoot the longest, with 18 years of the event under his belt, many of those coming out on top of all shooters. Schoenberg's fiancé, Katherine Hood, took top honors for the Significant Other Shoot Off Competition on Sunday. Department of Public Safety Commissioner Joseph Masters took the High Score, bringing home the trophy for the Commissioner's Cup for the second

to know each other better on a personal basis as well as strengthen their working partnership. Some of the Troopers competing this weekend have had to reach across the border and work with Mounties. The Shoot gives them an opportunity to establish and strengthen those long-standing relationships with RCMP.

The 50th Anniversary of the longest known international shooting competition was celebrated with a formal dinner on Friday, Aug. 13th. Mounties attended wearing their Red Surge uniforms and Troopers donned the AST blue tunics. RCMP Commissioner Bill Elliot

traveled from Ottawa, Ontario to attend the anniversary celebration and watch some of the competition.

This year, The Shoot was held at the Grey Mountain shooting range in Whitehorse, Yukon. There, a team of Schoenberg, Commissioner Masters, Hall, AWT Sgt. Brent Johnson of King Salmon, Trooper Andrew Neason of Fairbanks, Trooper Steve Lantz of Fairbanks and alternate Sgt. Chad Goeden of Fairbanks shot side by side with their RCMP partners standing behind them. This included shooting at targets with the RCMP's standard issue 9 mm Smith and Wesson. Similarly, the

Mounties shot a course using their Trooper partner's standard issue pistol, the .40-caliber Glock. They took turns running through the AST and RCMP shooting courses with the respective guns. This relates to a case years ago where the Mounties and Troopers were working together to track down a suspect near Hyder, a border community in Southeastern Alaska with a neighboring Canadian community just across the international line. Policy prevented the Trooper from using his service weapon in Canada when the

Trooper crossed the border. The Mounties had to provide him with one of their weapons to use during the apprehension.

The tactical portion of the competition involved firing not only pistols, but also a variety of other firearms and then running to the next station – all after beginning the course by doing 15 jumping jacks to get the heart rate going.

Next year, the event will return to Alaska. The date and location will be determined at a later time.
