


Justice 125 – Introduction to Addictions

Survey of the theories of addiction including the disease model of addiction, behavioral addictions, addiction treatment, and more. Focus will center on those addictions specific to Alaska. 3 credits. Offered by distance learning. Prerequisite: None.

JUST 110 Introduction to Law Enforcement

Survey of the structure and process of criminal justice agencies. Includes an introduction to criminal law, police, courts, corrections and criminology. Introduces students to the history of the U.S. criminal justice system, traces the origins and historical foundation of present day systems and associated agencies, focusing on law enforcement in our society. Also introduces students to various political theories of justice and principles of causation as it relates to criminal behavior. 3 credits. Offered by distance learning. Prerequisite: None.

JUST 121 Policing in the Community

Introduces students to the function of law enforcement in our society with an emphasis on basic patrol procedures in the community. Also exposes students to crisis intervention and emergency police procedures including emergency police communications, interpersonal relations and problem solving. 3 credits. Offered by distance learning. Prerequisite: None.

JUST 131 Rural Justice in Alaska

Students will be introduced to a description of crime occurring within, and the various state, municipal and tribal law enforcement agencies protecting rural and small town Alaska, including Municipal and Borough Police, Village Public Safety Officers, Tribal Police, Village Police and State Troopers. Also introduced are other justice-related agencies and their role and presence in bush communities. An examination of the application of the western justice system to remote Alaska villages including issues that arise from cultural conflicts, difficulties associated with a centralized justice system servicing remote communities off the road system. 3 credits. Offered by distance learning. Prerequisite: None.

JUST 212 Criminal Procedure

Students will be presented with an introductory examination of criminal procedures and how those procedures are applied by law enforcement agencies and criminal justice professionals. Emphasis upon the legal limitations of the police and the right of the people to be secure from the government under the protections of the United States Constitution and the Rules of Evidence. Prerequisite: JUST S110.

JUST 252 Criminal Law

A general study of the elements, purposes, and functions of criminal law with emphasis on historical and philosophical concepts. 3 credits. Offered by distance learning. Prerequisite: JUST 110 or instructor permission.
