Strangulation Response, Investigation, & Prosecution Virtual Training April 29 & 30, 2024 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Non-fatal strangulation has been identified as a key indicator for risk of lethality in domestic violence cases. This advanced course offers an in-depth and multidisciplinary approach to these types of assaults. This course is designed for law enforcement, prosecution professionals, and forensic medical professionals.

The following individuals are eligible to apply:

CDVSA funded victim service providers, prosecutors, and paralegals from Department of Law, commissioned Alaskan law enforcement, and Alaskan forensic medical providers.

The core objectives of this advanced two day course:

- ◆ Identify key factors in the lethality of strangulation;
- ◆ Describe the anatomy, physiology, and signs and symptoms of strangulation in surviving and non-surviving cases;
- ◆ Improve documentation of strangulation cases in the context of intimate partner violence, sexual assault, and child abuse;
- ◆ Discuss best-practices in trauma-informed advocacy, interviewing, prosecution, and/or patient/case management and;
- ◆ Develop local experts to use in trial.
