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Council on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault

Established within the Department of Public Safety, the Council on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault plans and coordinates services to victims and families of domestic violence and sexual assault as well as to the perpetrators of domestic violence and sexual assault.

The Council, in coordination with authorities in the field of domestic violence and sexual assault, develops, implements, maintains, and monitors crisis-intervention and prevention programs. This coordination includes providing emergency safe-housing, counseling, education/outreach services, and technical assistance to programs. The Council also works cooperatively with the Departments of Law, Education and Early Development, Public Safety, Health and Social Services, the Alaska Court System and other state agencies and community groups that are addressing the issues of domestic violence and sexual assault. The Council oversees, monitors, and coordinates existing services and develops expanded services and programs to meet the needs of victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and other violent crimes.

The Council provides funding to 21 victim services programs and to thirteen batterers' intervention programs in Alaska. Victim services programs provide a full range of services for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and their families. Programs provide 24-hour emergency support, safe-housing, accompaniment to medical care, childcare, counseling, employment information, housing information, legal information, and long-range safety planning. Programs also work within their communities to affect systemic change for responding to victims of sexual assault and domestic violence. Batterers intervention programs provide intervention that is focused on victim safety and batterer accountability. These community-based and prison programs work in conjunction with the court system, adult probation and parole, as well as victim services agencies within their area.

The Council continues to work with victim advocates, law enforcement, prosecution, corrections, batterers intervention program staff, and other important groups to ensure a coordinated community response to domestic violence and sexual assault. Our objective is to increase reporting and safety for victims, train all those involved in the community response to victims of both sexual assault and domestic violence, and hold batterers accountable for their violence. In addition to providing funding for these comprehensive programs throughout the state, the Council has taken a lead role in the implementation of the Violence Against Women Act, and a number of other local, regional and statewide strategic planning efforts.

Additional work needs to be done to provide victims with long-term support that enables them to build lives outside of violent relationships, and it is especially critical to provide increased services to children who are victims of sexual and physical abuse or who witness violence within their homes. The Council, through planning, coordination and implementation is helping to affect social change to reduce the incidence and alleviate the horrific effect of domestic violence and sexual assault in Alaska.

FEDERAL FUNDING SOURCES

Family Violence Prevention Services Act (\$710,665)

The Family Violence Prevention Services Act provides federal funding to all states. This funding is used to fund domestic violence programs throughout Alaska. All programs receiving these grants provide shelter and/or related assistance to victims of domestic violence and their children. These programs operate shelter facilities that are staffed around the clock and provide a full spectrum of services. These services include basic food and immediate shelter, crisis intervention, counseling and medical/legal/personal advocacy.

Victims of Crime Act (\$1,246,000)

The Victims of Crime Act of 1984, (VOCA), authorizes financial compensation for victims of crime and financial support for state and local agencies that provide services to crime victims. This fund is a U.S. Treasury account generated entirely by the fines and penalties levied against criminals convicted of federal crimes. As such, the amount available in this fund can vary greatly from year to year. To assist in planning for these variances, the Council spreads the grant amount over a period of three years thus providing a more stable continuation of funding for programs.

The Council awards the majority of this funding directly to programs that provide services to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and other violent crimes. In addition to funding programs, a portion of this grant is used to fund a Victim Services Coordinator position with the Department of Corrections. The coordinator works to enhance services to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and all other violent crimes in the state. Especially helpful in this effort is the VINE, (Victim Identification and Notification Everyday), which allows victims 24 hour access to the status of the perpetrator.

Sexual Assault Prevention (\$30,000)

The Council receives sexual assault prevention funds each year from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. These funds are part of a larger grant that is administered by Alaska's Department of Health and Social Services, Division of Public Health. These funds have been utilized for programs that provide prevention education to teens, the creation of public-service announcements, and maintaining a staff position dedicated to addressing the issues of sexual assault.

Violence Against Women Act

In 1994, Congress passed the Violence Against Women Act, (VAWA), which serves to improve the national response to domestic violence and sexual assault. This Act was renewed in 2000. VAWA combines a series of federal sanctions and initiatives as well as national, state, and local resources to improve the response to crimes against women. These funds are delineated to four specific areas: prosecution, law enforcement, victim services and discretionary. The Council is the lead agency for the coordination and management of the Violence Against Women Act funds for the State of Alaska.

A statewide Violence Against Women Planning and Implementation Committee carefully considers annual VAWA spending and implementation plans. The membership of the VAWA committee reflects the mandatory breakdown of the act and includes representatives from the Alaska Court system, Departments of Corrections, Health and Social Services, Law, Public Safety, the Alaska Network on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, Alaska Judicial Council, and Violence Against Indian Women grantees.

This committee meets quarterly to develop the annual plan for VAWA funding and to address any difficulties or needs identified in the state. The annual plan is submitted by the committee to the Council for fiscal approval. The Council then submits the plan to the Federal VAWA office and is responsible for distributing and monitoring the fiscal components of all the projects, as well as providing quarterly reports to the Federal VAWA office. Funding was used for the following projects in FY 2001.

Victim Services (\$214,035)

- Provided legal assistance to battered women throughout Alaska through the Legal Advocacy Project
- Trained domestic violence advocates in the area of legal advocacy
- Implemented a pro bono referral project to improve access to legal representation for victims
- Provided legal advocacy to battered, immigrant women with outreach to rural and bush communities
- Increased access to court translators within the legal system
- Developed a network of qualified translators available to victims for court appearances

Prosecution (\$178,362.50)

- Provided annual training for prosecutors and paralegals
- Purchased equipment to improve capabilities for presenting evidence in court
- Developed written guidelines for paralegal work in cases involving violence against women

Law Enforcement (\$178,362.50)

- Trained law enforcement officers on domestic violence and sexual assault, investigation issues and determining primary aggressor
- Implemented procedures for ensuring documentation of all domestic violence injuries and related evidence
- Continued funding for Program Coordinator position to coordinate training and other violence-against-women activities

Discretionary (\$107,017.40)

- Continued training of magistrates and judges on domestic violence
- Funded Sexual Assault Response Team training for all team members
- Translated *Victims of Domestic Violence* booklet into six languages

Rural Domestic Violence and Child Victimization (\$500,000)

The Rural Domestic Violence and Child Victimization Enforcement Grant Program implements certain provisions of the Violence Against Women Act. The program provides a unique opportunity for law enforcement, prosecution agencies, the courts, non-governmental victim services agencies, community organizations, businesses in rural communities, and Indian tribes to collaborate in creating protocols and strategies tailored specifically to meet the needs of rural populations.

In Alaska, this grant provided for several projects that were implemented over the past two years. In 1998, the Interdepartmental Child Sexual Abuse Agreement was revised and expanded to include all forms of child abuse. The Division of Family and Youth Services rewrote their child abuse and neglect screening protocols to include screening and responding to domestic violence. This project has been successfully completed.

There were 11 regional trainings scheduled for a projected 800 participants. However, due to the high level of commitment on the part of professionals and the significant need, the number of trainings were expanded to 15 with almost 1600 in attendance. Participants included victim advocates, local police, prosecutors, social workers, Indian Child Welfare workers, health providers and a number of community members. The trainings provided information on the issues of domestic violence, the impact it has on children, effective intervention strategies and the creation of interdisciplinary teams.

Grants to Encourage Mandatory Arrests (\$710,665)

The Grants to Encourage Arrests Policies Program is also a component of the Violence Against Women Act. This grant focuses on the development and implementation of laws, policies, and protocols that encourage or mandate the arrest of domestic violence offenders. The criteria for this is based on probable cause, or violation of a protective order. Projects for the current grant include a misdemeanor domestic violence offender pilot-probation project. This project tracked batterers in compliance with sentencing in Palmer. Additionally, volunteer legal advocates have been trained and placed in district attorney offices statewide. Approximately 200 Polaroid cameras were purchased for local and state law enforcement officers. Nine regional Native non-profit corporations provided training for all Village Public Safety Officers. In addition, an automated system for tracking protective orders was developed in the Department of Public Safety. This Central Registry allows any law enforcement agency in the state a 24 hour access to all protective orders filed in Alaska, thereby significantly increasing victim safety.
