

Our Vision: Alaska, free from domestic and sexual violence

Our Mission: We promote the prevention of domestic violence and sexual assault and provide safety for Alaskans victimized or impacted by domestic violence and sexual assault through a statewide system of crisis intervention and support, and by demanding perpetrator accountability.

Who We Are: CDVSA is located within the Alaska Department of Public Safety and is governed by an 11-member board.

What We Do: CDVSA is responsible for making sure Alaska has a system of statewide crisis intervention services (such as local shelter programs), perpetrator accountability programs (approved battering intervention programs), and prevention programs.



DV/SA Victim Crisis Services

Education, Outreach, and Collboration


- Public education and outreach to raise awareness of DV/SA

 Eradicate violent behavior by providing a 36–52-week course designed to rehabilitate, educate, and change behavior of perpetrators

How We Do It

CDVSA provides funding for community-based programs serving individuals, families, and communities impacted by domestic and sexual violence. These community-based grantees and sub-grantees support our state's system of intervention, prevention, and rehabilitation services and are located throughout the state.

Prevention & Partnerships: Why It Matters

Alaska has some of the highest rates of domestic violence and sexual assault in the country: **about 58% of Alaska women experience intimate partner violence, sexual violence, or both in their lifetime.** This translates to economic costs of over \$7 billion. Primary prevention stops violence before it occurs, and **promoting protective factors through comprehensive prevention services and outreach saves money in the long run.** Partnerships further help reduce costs, because many of the factors that put people at risk of domestic violence also put them at greater risk for mental health struggles, substance use, and suicide.

In addition to providing victim and rehabilition services to support healing and prevent further harm, CDVSA and our grantees and partners deepened their prevention work in SFY24:
