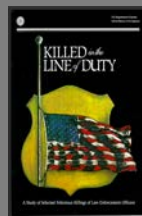
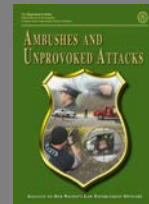
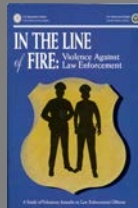

Law Enforcement Officers Killed & Assaulted

OFFICER SAFETY AWARENESS TRAINING (OSAT)

The results of over 20 years of national studies involving the felonious killing and assaulting of law enforcement officers. (8 hours)

DESCRIPTION: This program provides information on the history and policy relating to the Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) Program. Also provided are in-depth analyses of two studies which were concluded in 1992 and 1997, and resulted in the publications "Killed in the Line of Duty" and "In the Line of Fire." The objectives of these studies were to identify elements in certain situations which led to the ultimate felonious deaths and serious injuries of police officers. Demographic and behavioral descriptors for the victim officers and the offenders were developed and are presented. The findings and resulting safety training issues are also presented.

The emphasis of the presentation will be focused on the final companion study which was concluded in 2006, and resulted in a publication entitled "Violent Encounters." This study examined 40 incidents where police officers survived life-threatening attacks. Demographic and behavioral descriptors for the victim officers and the offenders were developed and are presented. The findings and resulting training issues are also presented.

OBJECTIVE: To assist law enforcement managers, trainers and personnel in the identification of training issues for the purpose of preventing the deaths and/or serious injuries of law enforcement personnel.

PRESENTATION MEDIUM: Course content is presented by a liaison specialist. Lecture and discussion is augmented by video recordings of the offenders and victim law enforcement officers. The interviews and research findings allow the audience to take a close look at ***why*** our nation's law enforcement professionals are being killed feloniously, accidentally and assaulted with an eye toward prevention. Handout materials will consist of a Compact Disc (CD) which includes LEOKA's three research projects - "*Killed in the Line of Duty*," "*In the Line of Fire*," and "*Violent Encounters*." Also provided is a "Take A.I.M" brochure to remind officers of the Awareness, Image, and Mindset they should maintain on a daily basis.



FBI INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY



Philip Wright, an 18 year law enforcement veteran, started his career in 1994 as a patrol officer with the Clarksburg Police Department (WV). He worked undercover in a multi-jurisdiction drug task force and was a member of the Special Response Team (SRT).

After five years with the Clarksburg Police Department, Philip joined the ranks of the West Virginia State Police where he spent a majority of his career in Criminal Investigations. Philip received specialized training in interview and interrogation techniques, statement analysis, crimes against children, sexual assault investigations, and was a member of specialized unit involving child abuse / sexual assaults against children. Philip was a certified forensic interviewer of children suspected of being sexually assaulted. His everyday responsibilities included emergency service calls, road law enforcement, traffic crash investigations, and major crime investigations.

Of significance to the LEOKA Program, Philip trained officers in the Officer Survivability Training (OST) course at the West Virginia State Police Academy.

In November of 2012, Philip joined the FBI Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) Program as a Training Instructor. Today, Philip continues to teach the Officer Safety Awareness Training (OSAT) course to law enforcement officers across this nation. Additionally, Philip conducts research through interviews of officers and offenders involved in a critical injury assault. The findings of the research are included in the OSAT curriculum.

Educationally, Philip completed his Criminal Justice degree through Marshall University.
